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## **State Elections**

On Saturday 15 March South Australians and Tasmanians went to the polls to set the course for the next four years.

The NDIS and the transition issues give much for state governments to think about. However, while the NDIS is an important social reform, it's important governments don't lose sight of the National Disability Strategy and the United Nations Convention that underpins it. More than ever before, governments need to take leadership on this,



ensuring that all key public services, including public transport, health and education are authentically inclusive of people living with disability.

It is also important that state and territory governments redouble their efforts to reduce the unmet needs waiting list, deepen state-funded individualised funding and prioritise the availability of community supports, especially for people wishing to leave congregate services such as Highgate Park in Adelaide.

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# **Building Capacity**

In 2012 JFA Purple Orange launched a capacity building workshop program for people living with disability and their families.

The program comprises seven topics centred upon our Model of Citizenhood Support 2<sup>nd</sup> edition:

- 1. You and Your Life
- 2. Making a Plan
- 3. Choices and Voices
- 4. Connected
- 5. Choosing your Personal Assistance
- 6. My Home, My Castle
- 7. Safeguarding for a Good Life



The workshops assist participants to explore how to build life chances in support a good life. They explore the Four Capitals outlined in the Model of Citizenhood Support, and the elements of Citizenhood and Personhood.

Feedback from participants suggests the workshops are particularly helpful for people taking up individualised funding options either in their state/territory or through the NDIS.

Since launching the workshops in Adelaide, we have extended the workshops to regional South Australia including Berri, Mt Gambier, Victor Harbor and Port Augusta to reach a broader audience and meet demand for the workshops. We can also set up customised workshops for people interested in having the even in their town or with their group.

As well as offering these workshops ourselves, the workshop program is now available for purchase on a licence fee basis for agencies to run for their staff and clients. This involves training with our staff to become an accredited facilitator.

Most recently we have extended the workshops to the Australian Capital Territory where we are working with two local agencies (Adacas and Imagine More) to run the workshops.
